Submission is Not a Dirty Word

Intro:

The Bible has a lot to say about our relationship with God and what it should look like. We might, however, be surprised at how much it has to say about our relationships with others as well.

Today we want to look at that very topic, our relationship with others, and see what we can learn from Scripture.

Background:

The book of Colossians seeks to correct some flawed thinking that had entered into the church at Colossae. Instead of reflecting on how desperately we needed Jesus' sacrifice and work in our lives and how generous and merciful Jesus was to provide it, we fall into a trap. We can find ourselves, like the Colossians, slipping into the thought process that salvation comes from Jesus Christ plus... Maybe it is Jesus plus good works. Perhaps it is Jesus plus the right Bible translation. For the Colossians, it was Jesus plus the observance of the right religious feast and the Sabbath Day. To some of the Colossian Christians, the right rituals were every bit as important as the right Savior, Jesus Christ. Thus, Paul desired to confront this dangerous teaching before it became a real problem.

Paul has spoken in chapter 1 of who Jesus is and why we should follow and worship Him. In chapter 2 he shares what Jesus does for us through His work and ministry. Chapter 3 takes a look at what a lifestyle of faith truly looks like. How does it look like in the key relationships in our lives?

Colossians 3:17-25 (NIV)
